

**Closing Organ Voluntary** 

Carillon de Westminster (Opus 54, No. 6)

Louis Vierne (1870-1937)

Ned's Notes: Our Organ Voluntaries are works of French organists, both born nearly blind: in the case of Langlais, he was completely blind as of two years old. Vierne (born with congenital cataracts), after surgery when he was six years old, was eventually able to distinguish people and shapes, and read large letters. Langlais's Suite Médiévale is a collection of pieces inspired by Gregorian melodies: his Prélude quotes the Asperges me, domine, the proper chant sung during the ritual sprinkling of the congregation with holy water. Vierne's very popular

Carillon de Westminster, however, uses the peal of the chimes of the clock tower of the Palace of Westminster, London. This thrilling work is a set of variations over, around, and above the chime melody (which Vierne alters, at one point, changing the order of the notes in the second phrase). The work began as an improvisation during a 1924 concert at Westminster Cathedral (not the Abbey), and was then heard in its present form on November 29, 1927, in Notre-Dame de Paris, almost 97 years ago to the day.

# **Book Group: Mondays With Merton**

Join us for our reading and discussion group based on the writings of Thomas Merton (1915-1968), a Trappist monk and one of the great spiritual figures of our time. "Mondays with Merton" is led by Fr. John and Emma Kennedy, PhD, and meets on Mondays from 7-8PM in the St. Mark's library. Emma and John met through their shared interest in Thomas Merton and led a Merton reading group together while students at Yale Divinity School. They are excited to bring this offering to St. Mark's and to share their love of Merton with the community.

We are reading *Conjectures of a Guilty Bystander* (1966), a series of notes, opinions, experiences and reflections

in which Merton examines some of the most urgent questions of our age. With his characteristic forcefulness and candor, he brings readers face-to-face with such provocative and controversial issues as the "death of God," politics, modern life and values, and racial strife–issues that are as relevant today as they were in the 1960s.

Each session begins with 10 minutes of silent contemplative prayer to ground ourselves in the Spirit and open our hearts before engaging our minds.
