



Ned's Notes: Our Offertory Anthem, Handel's And the glory of the Lord shall be revealed (from Messiah) needs no introduction or commentary. But what about our Organ Voluntaries (organ solos on Laissez paitre vos bêtes ("Let your flocks graze") and our Anthem during the Communion, O come, divine Messiah? The original text, Venez, divin Messie ("Come, divine Messiah"), to be sung in Advent to the tune of Laissez paître vos bêtes, was penned by the Abbot Simon-Joseph Pellegrin (1663-1745): the English version dates from 1872. Venez, divin Messie is still sung throughout France during Advent and Christmas. I arranged this version for our Choir (with organ accompaniment) in 2019.
